What Is Sculpture?

Sculpture is using different **materials** to create 3D structures.



Joining Materials Together


You need to think about the ways you can fix or **join** different parts of your sculpture together. You might choose glue, tape or elastic bands.



Using Different Materials

Sculptures can be created using many different types of **materials** such as:

- cardboard
- plastic
- concrete
- food
- ice
- wood
- clay



Vocabulary

<p>Ceramics</p>	<p>pots and other articles made from clay hardened by heat.</p>
<p>Abstract</p>	<p>relating to or denoting art that does not attempt to represent external reality, but rather seeks to achieve its effect using shapes, colours, and textures.</p>
<p>Carving</p>	<p>an object or design carved from a hard material as an artistic work.</p>
<p>Sculpture</p>	<p>the art of making three-dimensional representative or abstract forms, especially by carving stone or wood or by casting metal or plaster.</p>
<p>Texture</p>	<p>the feel, appearance, or consistency of a surface or substance.</p>
<p>Tone</p>	<p>the relative lightness or darkness of a colour</p>
<p>Twisting</p>	<p>form into a bent, curling, or distorted shape.</p>

Using Line, Shape, Form and Space

Sculptors use line, shape, form and space when creating their work.

- Lines create outlines and they can be different lengths or widths.
- Lines which meet up create shapes.
- Form creates depth and 3D shapes.
- Space lies around, in or between an object.

Famous Sculptors

Marc Quinn	Marc often uses unusual materials such as bread, flowers and ice. Many of his sculptures relate to the human body.
Michelle Reader	Michelle's sculptures are made out of recycled materials . They look like real things.
Barbara Hepworth	Many of Barbara's abstract sculptures are made from stone, wood and bronze. Some are very large and are exhibited outside.
Jill Townsley	Jill's abstract sculptures are made from everyday materials such as staples and plastic spoons.
Brendan Jamison	Brendan uses materials such as sugar cubes, wax, wool and wood to create figurative sculptures. Many of his sculptures are of buildings.
Eva Rothschild	Eva works with materials such as concrete, steel, polystyrene and paper to create abstract sculptures.
